

# ELMWOOD CEMETERY SEARCH IS NOW ONLINE

Family members can now find where their relatives are located within the cemetery grounds by going to a web based program obtained by the City's GIS department. Visit masoncity.net and select 'Elmwood-St. Joseph Cemetery' from 'Departments A-H' on the 'Your Government drop down menu. Enter the first and last name of the person you want to find. The program searches the Cemetery Management System and locates the person on a Google map. If you have this link on your smartphone, you can use it when you're on the cemetery grounds. The program will also show you where you are in relation to the person you want to find

The program will allow genealogy searches by typing in a last




name only, the program will show all the people with that name. Even part of a name can be entered if you're not sure of the spelling and the program will identify every name with that chain of letters. As cemetery staff and volunteers continue to quality check the large amount of information dating back to the 1860s, we ask the public for their patience in obtaining accurate data. # NEW LULLARY LANE IN ELMWOOD CEMETERY

Members of the Mason City Chamber's Leadership North Iowa (LNI) class took on an ambitious community impact project this year: to construct "Lullaby Lane," a memorial pathway in Lullaby Land at Elmwood Cemetery. Lullaby Land is a designated section in the cemetery where children lost to miscarriages less than 20 weeks are laid to rest. LNI and the Mercy Medical Center - North Iowa's Fetal and Infant Loss Bereavement Committee partnered on this project as an effort to help those grieving the loss of a child. Parents who lose a child to miscarriage have the option of having their child's name and date of loss engraved on a paver in the pathway.

LNI participants solicited donations, completed radio and television interviews to spread the word, and

With the use of a reporting tool, SeeClickFix, residents can report non-emergency quality-of-life issues such as garbage, junk, rubbish refuse, snow or ice on public sidewalks, overgrown grass or weeds a more through the city's website, Facebook page or a smart phone.

- To use the city's website located at www.masoncity.net:

  Click on SeeClickFix located in the left column on the home page;

  Click on the "Report tab";

  Enter an address or drag the red marker to the location of the issue and click "Next";

  Choose a category from the drop-down menu that matches your concern;

  Fill out the required fields

You may upload an image if available. If it is a sensitive issue, select "Keep it anonymous". An e-mail address is required for submission lit is never shown. Your issue now shows at the top of the page. There is no cost to download the app.

To use an iPhone, Android, Windows or Blackberry mobile phone, download the SeeClickFix app from the app store and follow the prompts.

SeeClickFix not only allows residents to report issues, in their neighborhood and elsewhere in the community, but also view, comment on and vote to fix problems submitted by their neighbors. Citizens can also create "watch areas" to receive notifications about all issues reported in their community, enabling them to follow all service requests, not just the ones

# SEASONAL REMINDERS

\*Alternate Side Parking – With the winter season comes snow. The Alternate Side Parking Ordinance will be placed in the event of measurable snowfall to assist the City crews in snow removal from City streets. When the Ordinance is in effect, citizens are to park on the even numbered side of the street on even numbered days and the odd numbered side of the street on odd numbered days. To learn the status, visit the City's website at www.masoncity.net and look for the icon on the left side of the page. Citizens can also call the Alternate Side Parking line at (641) 424-7188 or like us on Facebook at CityofMasonCity for status updates.

\*Free sand available - Sand is available for Mason City residents to use for ice control on sidewalks during the winter. The pile is located across the street from the Water Treatment Plant on the east side of Elm Drive in the vacant lot.

\*Holiday tree pick-up - Place the tree on the curb prior to 7 am on Wednesday, January 11, 2017. If the tree is over 6 feet tall, please cut it in half and remove everything from the tree before placing it on the curb. Roping or wreaths that contain wire can be placed in regular garbage or taken to a disposal site at 14th Street NE and Elm Drive by Wednesday, January 11. Flocked trees cannot be picked up - residents may take them to a disposal site at 14th Street NE and Elm Drive by Wednesday, January 11.

\*Year round large item collection – It's time to start thinking about spring cleaning. City sanitation customers can schedule an appointment to have large items collected on their regular sanitation collection day. Once an appointment is made with Sanitation, items should be placed at the curb with the correct number of stickers by 7 am on the scheduled appointment day. This pickup is for Mason City Sanitation customers only - no businesses are included. Visit the City's website at www.masoncity.net or call the Sanitation Division at (641) 421-3691 for a list of the large items, the number of stickers necessary for each item and a list of items not allowed for pick up.

\*Snow removal – Citizens are reminded to make sure all snow and ice is cleared from sidewalks within 48 hours after a snowfall. Do not move snow or ice into the street when clearing driveways and sidewalks. To report a property that has not removed snow from the sidewalk after 48 hours of a snowfall, contact the Neighborhood Services Division at (641) 421-3380.

\*Tree trimming on city property – Contact the Street Department at (641) 421-3675 for trees or shrubs that need attention that are in the City right-of-way, parking, or public place in the City. Make sure to have the address and/or specific location of the tree or shrub when contacting staff.


