Mason City Celebrates Arbor Day

Arbor Day began in 1872 in the state of Nebraska when J. Sterling Morton proposed to the Nebraska Board of Agriculture that a special day be set aside for the planting of trees. The holiday was first observed with the planting of an estimated one million trees in Nebraska and Arbor Day is now celebrated in all 50 states and many countries throughout the world. Trees play an important role in our lives: trees can reduce the erosion of precious topsoil by wind and water, help with energy efficiency



by cutting heating and cooling costs, moderate the temperature, clean the air, produce life-giving oxygen, and provide habitat for wildlife. They are also a renewable resource giving us paper, wood for our homes, fuel for our fires and countless other wood





products. Trees in our city increase property values, enhance the economic vitality of business areas, and beautify our community, and wherever they are planted, they serve as a source of joy and spiritual renewal. Arbor Day is celebrated in lowa the last Friday in April every year. The Mayor and City Council members commemorated Arbor Day by planting a Korean Maple tree at the MacNider Art Museum and Mayor Bookmeyer designated Arbor Day in Mason City by signing a proclamation at a Council meeting. Street/Park Supervisor Bob Berggren taught students proper tree planting techniques and the importance of correct tree planting measures at 2 separate tree planting

events this past spring. Students were also educated on the history and importance of celebrating Arbor Day and taking care of trees year round, not just when they are planted. Over 300 trees of diverse species were planted thanks to the hard work and dedication of volunteers to improve the environment and quality of life in Mason City.

Mason City Designated as a Tree City USA

In honor of its commitment to effective urban forest management, Mason City received the 'Tree City USA' designation for the 13th year. The Tree City USA program is sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation in partnership with the U.S.



Forest Service and the National Association of State Foresters and has been greening up communities across the country since 1976. This nationwide movement provides the framework necessary for communities to manage and expand their public trees. Mason City achieved the four core standards of sound urban forestry management to become a Tree City USA by maintaining a tree board or department, having a community tree ordinance, spending at least \$2 per capita on urban forestry, and celebrating Arbor Day. Trees are assets to a community when properly planted and maintained, and they help improve the visual appeal of a neighborhood, increase property values, reduce home cooling costs, remove air pollutants and provide wildlife habitats, among many other benefits. As a Tree City USA recipient, Mason City joins more than 3,400 cities and towns in all 50 states with a population total of 137 million people.

Want to Help Plant Trees?

Volunteers have been planting trees in Mason City for many years. Strong partnerships with sponsors and many volunteer groups including students from the Alternative School, elementary schools and even



pre-school/daycare facilities ensure trees are planted around the

Location and Upkeep


In determining where to plant trees, City staff determines the best type of tree to be planted at specific locations to include diverse species of trees, consideration of height and width of the mature tree and any obstacles that may pose a concern as the tree develops. It is important to not only plant trees but to maintain the trees that we already have. The City has added an aerial basket truck to its fleet of vehicles and hired additional staff members dedicated as an Arborist crew. This crew is responsible for the trimming of trees in the street right-of-way and at all city facilities including parks, the cemetery, and golf course. The crew will continually train to ensure the safety of personnel, property, power lines and other potential barriers.

FIREWORKS FOR NEW YEAR'S SEASON

Fireworks can legally be set off in Mason City on December 31 from 9 am until 12:30 am on January 1 with the exception of certain areas in the City. City Code Section 8-3-11 restricts the places where fireworks may be discharged in the City of Mason City. They may not be set off on public property (including schools, parks and cemeteries) or within 200 yards of hospitals, hospice care centers, or nursing homes. Be a good neighbor and respect others' property and sensitivity. Most of all - be careful!

The City has invested \$40,000 to update the house. A new electrical service, new furnace and boiler and new water heater have been installed. In addition, both bathrooms and the kitchen have been completely overhauled with new cabinets and appliances. In addition, many of the windows are new. The house features first floor laundry hookups and a flexible space that could be used for an office or a fourth bedroom. For storage, there is a ¾ basement and large 2-stall garage in the back yard. Located in a redeveloping neighborhood near Downtown, the Library and MacNider Museeum, it is less than half a mile from East Park. This house is

This house is a great first home for a young and growing family, at a price that cannot be beat. It is available for \$59,100. The buyer will receive instant equity, as this home has been appraised at \$69,100. The successful buyer must qualify for bank financing and have a family income no higher than 120% of the area median income (\$77,300 for a family of four). The buyer obtains a mortgage for the purchase price less any down payment. At closing, the City will place a second mortgage on the property for the \$40,000 in renovation costs. If the owner does not sell for at least seven years, the City's second mortgage will be forgiven. If the buyer sells before seven years have passed, the owner must pay back the unforgiven balance of the City's mortgage (i.e., if the home is sold after five years, the seller must pay the final two years of the loan prior to or at closing). Monarch Butterfly Garden Developing at Georgia Hanford Park

The Mason City Parks Department has seeded a five-acre pollinator garden in the Art Gerk Arboretum at Georgia Hanford Park, helping with the Monarch Butterfly conservation efforts in Mason City. The Monarch population has plummeted in recent years, declining in numbers. The gardens are being developed to promote an increase in the species. The process to develop the garden is extensive. The area is first prepared with a controlled burn, then the ground is tilled. Treatment for weed control to remove unwanted weeds, prairie seed planting and mowing are the next steps in the garden. This whole process will take approximately 2-3 years to establish the prairie restoration. A big thank you to Ozzie Ohl for his outstanding fundraising efforts to make this garden a reality.

SUCCESSFUL LAUNCH OF NEW BIKE SHARE PROGRAM



The Active Living and Transportation (A.L.T.) Commission, an outcome of Blue Zones Project, ordered twelve bikes that serve as the first phase of the new bike share program, with approval and support from the City Council and the Parks and Recreation Board. Bike rack locations will be at

Lity Hall, East Park Prairie Playground parking area, and at MacNider Lampgrounds. The program will increase accessibility to biking around the City, omplementing the expansion of the bike trail system. Equipment is sourced rom Koloni Bike, a bike share platform that uses Bluetooth technology to provide a simple and affordable experience for users and operators. "The bikes are rented through an app, so a smart phone and credit card will be required. The instructions will be on each bike rack on how to download and put in your personal information and credit card information. The app will then send you a ode for you to unlock the bike," says Dr. Steven Shurtz, Chairman of the A.L.T. Commission. Learn How YOU Can make Mason City a safer Place to Walk and Bike

Just imagine: Mason City as the premier Midwestern micropolitan community for livability and well-being. The City has completed major projects in the last several years jump starting the 15 year Activating Mason City Bicycle Pedestrian Mosterplan working lowards that vision. But now the community needs to educate our residents and visitors on the overall safe



usage. Improved safety is a critical goal and is fundamental to the efforts to increase the number of people, both residents and visitors, who walk and bike in the city. The Active, Living, and Transportation (ALT) Commission created four videos to address this need with funding by the Cerro Gordo County Community Foundation and the Mason City Police Department. The project is a call to action encouraging individuals to have a knowledge and understanding of usage of the transportation system-sidewalks, trails, bike lanes, sharrows, and roadways. The videos each target a different audience focusing on bicycle and pedestrian safety, traffic laws, general courtesy and self-protection as well as knowledge of the overall trail system and off-street connectivity. This project builds on the foundation of annual bike education for all third grade classrooms in the City and bike rodeos.
