Aaron Burnett is the new City Administrator for the City of Mason City. He replaces former City Administrator Brent Trout who resigned in 2017 to become the City Manager for the City of Topeka, Kansas. During the interim, Finance Director Kevin Jacobson served as the Interim City Administrator.

Aaron began his service with the City of Mason City in June and has been in city management since 2010 working previously for both Keokuk, Iowa and Humboldt, Iowa. As the first administrator for the City of Keokuk, he estab-

lished a strong culture of professional city management within the city and received the Iowa City Manager of the Year award for 2017. Additionally,

Aaron has been recognized by the International City/County Management Association with the designation of Credentialed Manager.

Prior to his work in local government, he was a legislative assistant to both Congressman Latham and Congressman Nussle. He is a graduate of the University of Iowa and has a Masters of Public Administration from the University of Nebraska at Omaha.

Mason City to Host Operation ReLeaf Tree Distribution Event

The City of Mason City will be the regional site for the Operation ReLeaf event this fall. This program, offered by Alliant Energy, gives residential utility customers the opportunity to purchase landscape trees at discount prices. Operation ReLeaf participants must be Alliant Energy residential customers in Iowa and willing to pick up their tree(s) on Saturday, October 6. The location for the pickup of trees will be at Norris Park at 2nd Street SW and South Adams Avenue between 9:30-11 am on October 6.

High-quality three- to eight-foot landscaping trees are offered for only \$25 each at this event. The trees, which retail for \$65 to \$125, are sold on a first-come, first-served basis. Advance reservation is required. Order forms will be required to be filled out in order to reserve a tree and there is a limit of two trees per household. Forms are available on the City's website at www.masoncity.net or at City Hall at 10 First Street NW.

This partnership initiative is funded by Alliant Energy and administered by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources Bureau of Forestry, in partnership with the conservation boards of host counties. Since 2001, more than 62,265 new trees have been planted throughout the state of Iowa during 189 Operation ReLeaf events.

Elmwood-St. Joseph Cemetery Historic District Recognized

The City was notified that the Elmwood-St. Joseph Cemetery Historic District was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in June 2018. The National Register is the official list of our country's historic buildings, districts, sites, structures, and objects worthy of preservation. It was established as part of the National Historical Preservation Act of 1966 and is overseen by the National Park Service. Listing historic properties in the National Register encourages their preservation, marks them as important touchstones of our shared heritage, and expands the National Register database, a valuable research tool accessible to the public.

The nomination process starts with the State Historic Preservation Office, which documents and evaluates properties according to uniform standards. The criteria is used to identify important historic properties worthy of preservation and consideration in making planning and development decisions.

The Elmwood-St. Joseph Cemetery Historic District joins the Rock Crest-Rock Glen Historic District, the Mason City Downtown Historic District, and numerous other buildings in Mason City listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

The National Register of Historic Places is administered by the National Park Service under the Secretary of the Interior, and managed at the state level by each respective state.

In honor of its commitment to effective urban forest management, Mason City received the 'Tree City USA' designation and the Growth Award this past spring.

The Tree City USA program is sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation in partnership with the U.S. Forest Service and the National Association of State Foresters and has been greening up communities across the country since 1976. This nationwide movement provides the framework necessary for communities to manage and expand their public trees. Mason City achieved the four core standards of sound urban forestry management to become a Tree City USA by maintaining a tree board or department, having a community tree ordinance, spending at least \$2 per capita on urban forestry, and celebrating Arbor Day. Trees are assets to a community when properly planted and maintained, and they help improve the visual appeal of a neighborhood, increase property values, reduce home cooling costs, remove air pollutants and provide wildlife habitats, among many other benefits.

Mason City has been a Tree City USA for 14 years and a Growth Award recipient for 3 years. The Growth Award is awarded by the Arbor Day Foundation to recognize higher levels of tree care by participating Tree City USA communities. The Growth Award highlights innovative programs and projects as well as increased commit-

ment of resources for urban forestry. It also provides an opportunity to share new ideas and successes across the country. The City's Growth Award Application focused on Literature Distribution, a Tree Maintenance Budget and Municipal Funding.

Ray Quayle Honored with the Service Above Self Award

The Mason City Noon Rotary Club annually recognizes a government employee to receive the 'Service Above Self' Award. The award is presented to a government employee for their actions both on and off the job. This year's recipient is Housing Inspector & Zoning Administrator Ray Quayle.

Ray received the award for the total overhaul of the Mason City Police Department's SOG team robot. Ray outfitted the robot with new electronics to make it functional for use in seeking out contraband, explosives, and similar dangerous situations where sending in an officer would be especially risky. He also was recognized for the work he does to help the landlords and tenants of this community. Ray was nominated by Development Services Director Steven Van Steenhuyse.

HEALTHY-Mason City was presented with a 2018 Healthy Hometown Community Award during the Iowa Healthiest State Initiative awards ceremony held earlier this year. The award recognizes Mason City for its accomplishments in health improvement initiatives within the community.

"We are pleased to present Mason City with an inaugural Healthy Hometown Community Award," said Jami Haberl, Iowa Healthiest State Initiative executive director. "The City has earned the title of 2018 Healthy Mason City and will also receive \$5,000 to continue the important work of improving the physical, social and emotional well-being of the community."

Mercy North Iowa has been a leader in both the work of HEALTHY-Mason City since its inception and the financial support. They recently recommitted their support with a three year pledge of \$25,000 per year.

HOME FOR SALE AT 430 1ST STREET NE

As part of a pilot affordable home program, the City purchased and rehabilitated the house at 430 1st Street NE. The property is offered for sale for a base asking price of only \$59,100. The City invested \$40,000 to renovate the home; the property has been appraised at \$69,100.

Here's how it works: The buyer must qualify for bank financing and have a family income no higher than 120% of the area median income (\$81,350 for a family of four). The buyer finances a loan for \$59,100 (less any down-payment or other source of owner equity). At closing, the buyer assumes two mortgages: the first with the loan provider for the base asking price, and one for \$40,000 with the City. If the owner does not sell for at least seven years, the loan is forgiven. If they do sell before seven years have passed, the owner must pay back the unforgiven balance of the loan (i.e., if the home is sold after five years, the seller must pay the final two years of the loan prior to closing).

The house has three bedrooms upstairs, with a possible fourth on the first floor. There are 1½ baths. The home is now completely rehabilitated and has a new electrical service, new furnace/ boiler and new water heater. Most of the windows are new. Brand new kitchen cabinets and new appliances make this an excellent starter home. There is a large, two-stall detached garage in the rear yard.
